#### TRUSTEE'S REPORT

#### YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2020

The Trustee of the Concord Plc Retirement Benefits Scheme ("the Scheme") presents its annual report together with the actuarial statement and financial statements for the year ended 5 April 2020.

#### Introduction

The Scheme is a final salary pension scheme which provides benefits to members in accordance with the Scheme Rules based on their length of service and their average salary prior to leaving or retirement (whichever is earlier).

The Scheme was closed to the future accrual of pension benefits on 31 August 2002.

The Scheme is a "registered pension scheme" for tax purposes.

All members of the Scheme are contracted-out of the State Second Pension.

#### Scheme advisers

There are written agreements in place between the Trustee and each of the Scheme advisers listed on page 1 of this report.

## Scheme constitution and management

The Scheme is governed by the Trustee who is required to act in accordance with the Trust Deed and the Scheme Rules, within the framework of pension and trust law. Trustees are appointed and removed in accordance with the Trust Deed by Concord Limited. The Scheme is currently exempt from the member-nominated trustee requirements introduced by the Pensions Act 2004 on the basis that the Trustee is independent of Concord Limited. There was one Trustee meeting during the year.

## Changes to the scheme

There were no significant changes to the Scheme during the year.

## Financial developments and financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared and audited in compliance with the regulations made under sections 41(1) and 41(6) of the Pensions Act 1995.

## Statement of Trustee's responsibilities

The financial statements, which are prepared in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), are the responsibility of the Trustee. Pension scheme regulations require, and the Trustee is responsible for ensuring, that those financial statements:

- show a true and fair view of the financial transactions of the Scheme during the Scheme year and of the amount and disposition at the end of the Scheme year of its assets and liabilities, other than liabilities to pay pensions and benefits after the end of the Scheme year; and
- contain the information specified in Regulations 3 and 3A of the Occupational Pension Schemes (Requirement to obtain Audited Accounts and a Statement from the Auditor) Regulations 1996, including making a statement whether the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the relevant financial reporting framework applicable to Occupational Pension Schemes.

In discharging the above responsibilities, the Trustee is responsible for selecting suitable accounting policies, to be applied consistently, making any estimates and judgments on a prudent and reasonable basis, and for the preparation of the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Scheme will not be wound up.

The Trustee is also responsible for making available certain other information about the Scheme in the form of an annual report.

The Trustee also has a general responsibility for ensuring that adequate accounting records are kept and for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the Scheme and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities, including the maintenance of an appropriate system of internal control.

The Trustee is responsible under pensions legislation for preparing, maintaining and from time to time revising a Schedule of Contributions showing the rates of contributions payable towards the Scheme by or on behalf of the employer and the active members of the Scheme and the dates on or before which such contributions are to be paid. The Trustee is also responsible for keeping records in respect of contributions received in respect of any active member of the Scheme and for adopting risk-based processes to monitor whether contributions are made to the Scheme by the employer in accordance with the Schedule of Contributions. Where breaches of the Schedule occur, the Trustee is required by the Pensions Acts 1995 and 2004 to consider making reports to The Pensions Regulator and the members.

## **Pension increases**

Pension increases are applied at 6 April each year. Pensions in payment in respect of pensionable service before 6 April 1997 increase by one of, nil, 3% per annum or by the minimum of 3% per annum and the CPI, published in the previous September. Pensions in payment in respect of pensionable service after 6 April 1997 increase by RPI, published in the previous September, subject to a minimum increase of 3% per annum and a maximum of 5% per annum.

#### Report on actuarial liabilities

Under Section 222 of the Pensions Act 2004, every scheme is subject to the Statutory Funding Objective, which is to have sufficient and appropriate assets to cover its technical provisions. The technical provisions represent the present value of the benefits members are entitled to, based on the benefits accrued to the valuation date. This is assessed using the assumptions agreed between the Trustee and the Company and set out in the Statement of Funding Principles, which is available to Scheme members on request.

The most recent triennial actuarial valuation of the Scheme was carried out as at 5 April 2018, with the following results:

Although there are no current plans to discontinue the scheme and buy-out liabilities with an insurance company, the Trustee also considers the level of funding relative to the estimated costs of such a buy-out (known as "solvency liabilities") and equivalent information on this basis is provided below:

The value of technical provisions is based on Pensionable Service to the effective date of the valuation (noting that the Scheme closed to future accrual with effect from 31 August 2002) and assumptions about various factors that will influence the Scheme in the future, such as the levels of investment returns and pay increases, when members retire and how long members will live. The method and significant actuarial assumptions used to determine the technical provisions are as follows (all assumptions adopted are set out in the Appendix to the Statement of Funding Principles):

#### Method

The actuarial method used in the calculation of the Technical Provisions is the Projected Unit Method.

Mortality (pre and post retirement) Mortality for all members is assumed to follow the

standard SAPS 'S2' All Pensioner Amounts tables, with a multiplier of 106% (males) / 98% (females) applied to the underlying mortality rates, applicable

to each member's year of birth.

In addition, an allowance has been made for future mortality improvements (from 2007) in line with the CMI 2017 core projections model with a 1.5% per

annum long term improvement rate.

The next actuarial valuation of the Scheme will be due on 5 April 2021.

#### **Investment report**

## Investment manager

The Scheme's managed fund investments are managed by Legal & General Assurance (Pensions Management) Limited, an investment manager appointed by the Trustee. The manager has full discretion to invest world-wide subject to the investment policies laid down by the Trustee. These investment policies are determined by the Trustee.

The investment manager's fees are primarily based on the market value of the assets under their management but commissions and fees are also levied on investment transactions.

The investment manager is appropriately authorised under the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000.

## Investment principles

The Trustee has produced a statement of investment principles as required by section 35 of the Pensions Act 1995 and this is available on request from the contact address set out on page 10.

## **Review of investment performance**

Details of the Scheme's investments are given in note 9 to the financial statements. An analysis of the Scheme's investments is provided below:

The Trustee considers that the spread of investments both geographically and by investment category enables the Scheme to benefit from potentially higher rates of investment growth in different markets whilst also decreasing the effect that price fluctuations within a particular market may have on the Scheme. The proportion of the Scheme's assets invested in a particular market is determined by reference to the relative rate of return and the relative level of risk associated with that market.

The Trustee considers that all the Scheme's investments are readily marketable.

The table below shows the performance of the funds managed by Legal & General Assurance (Pensions Management) Limited for 1 year, 3 years and 5 years to 31 March 2020 relative to the appropriate benchmarks.

## Socially responsible investments

The Trustee recognises that the management of investment risks is over the longer term and requires consideration of many financially material factors. Significantly, it recognises the importance of the ability of the investment portfolio to create, sustain and protect value so that it can deliver returns in line with the Trustee's objectives over at least the term of the Recovery Plan. An important part of this longer term view is the impact of factors arising from environmental, social and governance matters (collectively "ESG") and climate change.

The importance of the Trustee understanding the long-term prospects for the assets in which it invests with due consideration of the above factors is, therefore, acknowledged. The Trustee also recognises that engagement and voting in connection with these factors as well as others can improve investment performance. It is, however, also recognised that the form of the Trustee's investments is all either pooled or collective vehicles which are managed by external parties appointed by the Trustee. As such, the Trustee is not directly involved with investments at a stock/organisation level and there is limited, if any, ability for engagement.

The Trustee has not taken into account non-financial matters (which are defined as the views of the members and beneficiaries including (but not limited to) their ethical views and their views in relation to social and environmental impact and present and future quality of life of the members and beneficiaries of the trust scheme) in the selection, retention and realisation of investments. This is because of the relative simplicity of the investment strategy and the need to focus on the financially material aspects of investment in order to achieve the funding objectives. The Trustee will review this aspect of the policy regularly.

The Scheme may use different managers and mandates to implement its investment policies. The Trustee ensures that, in aggregate, its portfolio is consistent with the policies set out in the Statement of Investment Principles, in particular those required under regulation 2(3)(b) of the Occupational Pension Schemes (Investment) Regulations (2005). The Trustee will also ensure that the investment objectives and guidelines of any particular pooled vehicle are consistent with its policies, where relevant to the mandate in question. Where segregated mandates are used, the Trustee will use its discretion, where appropriate, to set explicit guidelines within the Investment Management Agreement to ensure consistency with the Trustee's policies, where relevant to the mandate.

To maintain alignment, managers are periodically provided with the most recent version of the Scheme's Statement of Investment Principles and are requested to confirm that the management of the assets is consistent with those policies relevant to the mandate in question.

The Trustee considers it important for ESG and climate change factors to be integrated into the investment process of the managers it has appointed. The Trustee also recognises the importance of responsible investing and good stewardship as a fundamental part of the activity of the appointed managers. The Trustee will monitor the activities of the managers on a regular basis with respect to relevant matters including capital structure of investee companies, actual and potential conflicts, other stakeholders and ESG impact of underlying holdings. However, the Trustee appreciates that its applicability may be limited for certain asset classes. These matters are kept under review by the Trustee, in consultation with their investment consultant and investment managers.

In relation to the socially responsible investments policies set out above, the Trustee requires the managers appointed by it to:

- Have developed an approach to integrating ESG factors in their investment process.
- Demonstrate a commitment to active ownership, engagement and voting.
- Be either a signatory of the Principles for Responsible Investment as supported by the United Nations or demonstrate a commitment to similar principles.

At least once in every twelve month period, the managers will be required to communicate and report to the Trustee on their activities/processes in relation to the above.

Mandates and relationships with existing managers will be reviewed periodically and, if necessary, brought into line with this policy where possible within 12 months. Where this is not possible, the Trustee will seek explanation from the manager and, if not satisfied, will consider the termination of the appointment. New mandates and relationships are required to meet the standards of this policy on a 'comply or explain' basis.

Should the Trustee's monitoring process reveal that a manager's portfolio is not aligned with the Trustee's policies, the Trustee will engage with the manager further to encourage alignment. This monitoring process includes specific consideration of the sustainable investment/ESG characteristics of the portfolio and managers' engagement activities. If, following engagement, it is the view of the Trustee that the degree of alignment remains unsatisfactory, the manager's appointment will be considered further.

## Rights attaching to investments

The Trustee's policy is to delegate responsibility for the exercising of rights (including voting rights) attaching to investments to the investment manager. The Trustee has reviewed and has accepted the investment manager's policy in respect of exercising of rights attaching to investment. The Trustee will periodically review the investment manager's policy as part of their ongoing monitoring of their investment manager.

## **Custodial arrangements**

The Scheme's investments are held in the names of nominees by the Scheme's investment custodians. The investment custodians operate systems of internal controls to ensure the security of the Scheme's assets.

#### **Employer-related investments**

There were no employer-related investments held at any time during the year or at the year end.

#### Calculation of transfer values

In accordance with Regulation 7D of the Occupational Pension Schemes (Transfer Values) (Amendment) Regulations 2008, the Trustee decided to reduce Cash Equivalent Transfer Values by 36% with effect from October 2019. The reduction was calculated based on the Scheme's funding position as at 5 April 2019.

#### 1. General information

The Scheme is established as a trust under English law. The address for enquiries to the Scheme is included in the Trustee's report.

## 2. Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Occupational Pension Schemes (Requirement to obtain Audited Accounts and a Statement from the Auditor) Regulations 1996, Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) - The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued by the Financial Reporting Council and the guidance set out in the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) (Revised June 2018).

This is the first year of adoption for the 2018 SORP. There have been no restatements of prior year figures as a result of this adoption

## 3. Accounting policies

The Scheme's functional currency and presentational currency is pounds sterling (GBP).

The following principal accounting policies have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements.

## **Contributions**

Employer deficit funding contributions are accounted for on the due date on which they are payable under the Schedule of Contributions or on receipt if earlier with the agreement of the Employer or Trustees.

## Transfers to other schemes

Individual transfers out of the Scheme are accounted for when paid which is normally when member liability is discharged.

## **Benefits**

Pensions payable in respect of the Scheme year are accounted for by reference to the period to which they relate. Other benefits are accounted for in the period in which the member notifies the Trustee of his or her decision on the type or amount of benefit to be taken or, if there is no member choice, on the date of retirement or leaving.

### **Expenses**

Administrative and investment management expenses are accounted for by reference to the period to which they relate.

## Investment income

Interest on cash deposits is accounted for by reference to the period to which it relates.

Investment income arising from the underlying investments of the pooled investment vehicles is reinvested within the pooled investment vehicles and reflected in the unit price. It is reported within 'change in market value'.

#### Investments

Pooled investment vehicles are valued at their bid price at the year end. The fees and costs of acquiring and disposing of investments are included in their purchase and sales price.

Contributions of £20,667 per month are payable from 1 January 2020 until 31 December 2020. Under the current Schedule of Contributions deficit funding contributions are due until 30 April 2047. The monthly contributions are scheduled to increase over time up to a maximum of £191,000 per month.

The Trustee holds assets invested separately from the main fund in the form of insurance policies, which secure additional benefits on a money purchase basis for those members electing to pay additional voluntary contributions. Members participating in this arrangement each receive an annual statement confirming the amounts held on their behalf and the movements in the year. The aggregate amounts of these AVC investments are shown above analysed by the insurance companies that provide and administer these policies.

#### 14. Fair value determination

#### 15. Investment risk disclosures

#### Investment risks

FRS 102 requires the disclosure of information in relation to certain investment risks. These risks are set out by FRS 102 as follows:

**Credit risk:** this is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation.

Market risk: this comprises currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk.

- Currency risk: this is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial asset will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates.
- Interest rate risk: this is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial asset will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates.
- Other price risk: this is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial asset will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting all similar financial instruments traded in the market.

The Trustee determines the investment strategy after taking advice from a professional investment adviser. The Scheme has exposure to investment risks because of the investments it makes in following the investment strategy set out above. The Trustee manages investment risks, including credit risk, interest rate risk and other price risk, within agreed risk limits which are set taking into account the Scheme's strategic investment objectives. These investment objectives and risk limits are implemented through the investment management agreements in place with the Scheme's investment managers and monitored by the Trustee by regular reviews of the investment portfolio.

Further information on the Trustee's approach to risk management, credit and market risk is set out below. This does not include AVC investments as these are not considered significant in relation to the overall investments of the Scheme.

### Investment strategy

The Trustee has the following investment objectives:

- The acquisition of and investment in suitable assets of appropriate liquidity, which will generate income and capital growth to meet, together with new contributions from the Company, the cost of the benefits which the Scheme provides.
- To limit the risk of the assets failing to meet the liabilities over the long term.
- To minimise the long term costs of the Scheme by maximising the return on the assets whilst having regard to the objectives shown above.

The Trustee sets the investment strategy taking into account considerations such as the strength of the employer covenant, the long term liabilities of the Scheme and the funding agreement with the Company. The investment strategy is set out in its Statement of Investment Principles ("SIP").

The Trustee's current investment strategy benchmark is set out below (with all such assets held in pooled funds):

Diversified Growth Fund:	54.0%

## Credit risk

The Scheme is subject to credit risk because the Scheme invests in pooled investment vehicles and is therefore directly exposed to credit risk in relation to the instruments it holds in the pooled investment vehicles. The Scheme is also indirectly exposed to credit risks arising on some of the financial instruments held by the pooled investment vehicles. The Scheme also has cash balances and so is subject to credit risk arising from these.

Credit risks arising on bonds held in the pooled investment vehicles is mitigated by investing in government bonds where the credit risk is minimal, or corporate bonds which are rated at least investment grade. Cash is held within financial institutions which are at least investment grade rated.

Direct credit risk arising from pooled investment vehicles is mitigated by the underlying assets of the pooled arrangements being ring-fenced from the manager and the regulatory environments in which the pooled managers operate. The Trustee monitors any changes to the operating environment of the pooled manager on an ongoing basis. The pooled arrangements used by the Scheme are all unit-linked contracts held with Legal and General Investment Managers.

The information about exposures to and mitigation of credit risk applied at both the current and previous year end. The Scheme's total exposure to credit risk at the year-end is £32,963,739 (2019: £34,195,829).

## **Currency risk**

The Scheme is subject to currency risk because some of the assets underlying the Scheme's diversified growth fund investments are held in overseas markets via pooled investment vehicles (indirect exposure). The Scheme's exposure to currency risk at the year-end was £4,177,551 (2019: £4,607,876)

#### Interest rate risk

The Scheme is subject to interest rate risk because some of the Scheme's investments are held in bonds (through pooled vehicles) and cash. The Trustee has set a benchmark for total investment in bonds of 46% (as per the 2019 year-end). The bond benchmark is set by the Trustee having regard to the nature of the Scheme's liabilities and in order to broadly match the liabilities in respect of pensioner members of the Scheme. If interest rates fall, the value of the bond investments will rise to help match the increase in actuarial liabilities arising from a fall in the discount rate. Similarly, if interest rates rise, the bond investments will fall in value, as will the actuarial liabilities because of an increase in the discount rate. The Scheme's exposure to interest rate risk at the year-end was £16,253,536 (2019: £15,764,325).

#### Other price risk

Other price risk arises principally in relation to the Scheme's diversified fund held in pooled vehicles. The Scheme has a set target asset allocation of 54% of investments being held in diversified growth funds (as per the 2019 year-end). The Scheme manages this exposure to overall price movements by holding a diverse portfolio of investments across various markets, via the use of pooled vehicles. At the year end the Scheme's exposure to other price risk was £16,710,203 (2019: £18,431,503).

## 20. Related party transactions

The Principal Employer, Concord Limited, bears certain costs of the Scheme itself. The costs borne by Concord Limited in relation to the Scheme are not reflected in these financial statements.

The Trustee fees are £25,828 in the current year and £19,537 in the prior year (2019).

All of the above transactions were made in accordance with the Scheme Rules.

## 21. Contingent liabilities and contractual commitments

In the opinion of the Trustee the Scheme had no contingent liabilities and no contractual commitments as at 5 April 2020 (2019 - Nil).

On 26 October 2018, the High Court handed down a judgement involving the Lloyds Banking Group's defined benefit pension schemes. The judgement concluded the schemes should be amended to equalise pension benefits for men and women in relation to guaranteed minimum pension benefits. The issues determined by the judgement arise in relation to many other defined benefit pension schemes.

The Trustee of the Scheme is aware that the issue will affect the Scheme and is reviewing the steps to implement the judgement at each Trustee meeting.

Under the ruling schemes are required to backdate benefit adjustments in relation to GMP equalisation and provide interest on the backdated amounts. The Trustee is yet to determine the exact methodology to equalise GMPs, and therefore it cannot yet estimate the likely backdated amounts and related interest. The back payments will be accounted for in the year they are determined.

However, the judgement did not address transfers out which will be subject to a second hearing expected in 2020. The Scheme has experienced historical transfers out which may be subject to adjustment depending on the judgements reached in this second ruling. It is not possible to estimate the value of any such adjustments at this point in time.

## 22. Subsequent events

On 11 March 2020, COVID-19 was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organisation. This has resulted in worldwide restrictions on travel, government fiscal stimulus and financial market volatility. The extent of the impact on the Scheme is currently unquantifiable in relation to the value of the Scheme's investments and the Principal Employer's business. The Trustee is satisfied that the Scheme is a going concern as the Principal Employer has sufficient resources to continue to meet their obligations to the Scheme for at least the next 12 months.
